Have you ever wondered how a certain square dance club got its name? The Glass Slippers cane by their name in a very logical manner. The club was organized in February, 1974 by Ron and Betty Fotch and employees of Owens-Illinois Glass Factory. Betty was an employee of O.I. at that time. Ron became their first caller. The dances were held in the Presbyterian Church in Brockport, but the club soon moved to the O.I. club house.

The club grew rapidly. By 1976 there were eighty members, most of whom lived outside of Brockport. They adopted a club outfit of blue and white gingham checked skirts and shirts which they wore for special occasions and their frequent visits to other clubs.

Many special dances were held - to celebrate anyone or anything. For two years the club put on an ox roast for the dancers of Dance-O-Rama, complete with bus service from the college to the O.I. pavilion.

Ron and Betty chaired Dance-O-Rama one year as did Elsie Epke. Sue and Dick Palmateer served as co-chairs of the C.U.R.E. Dance with Nancy and Roger Dart.

The club has demonstrated at sidewalk sales. They've had floats in several local firemen's parades. As a group thay were very involved and active. This could have been partly because whole families danced with the Glass Slippers. The teen members won a competition at Syracuse State Fair. The club was very proud of them.

In 1985 when Ron and Betty retired to Florida, Bill Ryan became our caller. Since January, 1988 Bob Meagher has been the man on stage.

For a few years the Glass Slippers danced in the Campus School of S.U.N.Y. Brockport. Later, when the Brockport-Clarkson-Sweden Recreation Commission became our sponsors, we moved to our present place in the Ginther Primary School. We dance there on Wednesday nights during the school year.

The first elected club presidents were Brenda and Butch Foresha. The 1988-1989 presidents are Charlotte and Bill Graham. In between, many fine presidents have served: Jane and Bob DuBois, Diane and Chuck Silvernail, Sue and Dick Palmateer, Pat and Jim McTamney, Mary and Carl Wass, Peggy and Roger Gilbert, and Elsie Epke.

The club has had its ups and downs. Like so many other clubs we have lost dancers who have moved away permanently, become snow-birds, or given up dancing entirely. At the same time the number of people in class has dwindled. The present club has three squares of dancers.

The Glass Slippers are looking forward to celebrating their fifteenth anniversary next February. Hopefully, we will have a class of eager learners to add to our friendly club as members in May 1989.




Promenading B's



MAGAZINE, the TONIGHT SHOW, and ABC'S GOOD MORNING AMERICA, Ron has had numerous articles written in national magazines about his involvement in square dancing.






